Northeast Florida Continuum of Care (CoC) Racial Disparities Preliminary Assessment August 2018

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In preparation for a more comprehensive assessment, the Northeast Florida CoC conducted a preliminary review of the homeless services community. In this appraisal, we found that Blacks or African Americans repeatedly show greater than 50 to 60% of the population reported as homeless in FL-510, which includes Duval, Clay and Nassau counties, but represented only 25% of the total population reported in Duval, Clay and Nassau counties, 16% in Florida and 12.6% in the United States in the 2010 and 2016 census data.

BACKGROUND

According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness, "Most minority groups in the United States experience homelessness at higher rates than Whites, and therefore make up a disproportionate share of the homeless population."

INTENT

It is the intent of the Northeast Florida Continuum of Care to review the community data as a first step to completing a thorough community racial disparities assessment which will include a qualitative data review such as surveys, interviews, and focus groups of community stakeholders (i.e. people experiencing homelessness, agencies providing homeless services and others as identified).

TARGET POPULATION OVERVIEW

Individuals who are homeless as defined by 24 CFR 573.3.

METHODS

The preliminary assessment includes a comparison and review of quantitative data for FL-510, Northeast Florida Continuum of Care.

The sources reviewed for this report were several years of population data from the U.S. Census Bureau 2010, 2016 and estimates for 2017¹, the 2016 and 2017 Annual Homeless Assessment Report to Congress², 2016 and 2017 Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) data, and the 2016 and 2017 Annual Point-in-Time Reports³.

DATA REVIEW

In the United States the racial breakout in 2010 shows Whites representing 72.4% and Blacks or African Americans at 12.6% of the total population, and all other races which includes American Indian and Alaska Native, Asian, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, Some Other Race and Multiple Races 5%. The estimated totals for 2016 reflect a slight increase with Whites representing 73.3% and Blacks or African Americans holding steady at 12.6% of the total population.

State of Florida

In Florida the racial breakout in 2010 shows Whites representing 75% and Blacks or African Americans at 16% of the total population, and all other races which includes American


Indian and Alaska Native, Asian, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, Some Other Race and Multiple Races 9%. The estimated totals for 2016 reflect a slight increase with Whites representing 75.9% and Blacks or African Americans with an even slighter increase at 16.1% of the total population.



After reviewing the 2010 and 2016 data for Duval, Clay and Nassau combined, Whites represent 66.3% and 67% respectively while Blacks or African Americans represent 25% in both 2010 and 2016. Please see page 6, Attachment A for county-specific details.

2016 AND 2017 ANNUAL HOMELESS ASSESSMENT REPORT (AHAR)







When reviewing the AHAR report, which captures totals for the entire year, the disparity between the number of Whites in comparison to the number of Blacks or African Americans reported in the population of people who are homeless show a significant inequality with Blacks

or African Americans representing more than 60% for both 2016 and 2017. Yet, they represent 25% of the community population.

2016 AND 2017 HOMELESS MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM (HMIS)






The HMIS system maintains information regarding the characteristics and service needs of Clients for a variety of reasons, including the provision of more effective and streamlined services and the creation of information which we can be used to evaluate services.

In 2016, 34% total number of HMIS Clients reported as White and 62% reported as Black or African American. In 2017, 36% of the total number of HMIS Clients reported as White and 60% reported as Black or African American. Again, Blacks or African Americans represented more than 60% of the population that is homeless and only 25% of the total community population.

FL 510, NORTHEAST FLORIDA POINT-IN-TIME DATA

Each year communities receiving McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Grants are required to conduct a count of people in shelters the last week of January while counts of the unsheltered (people living on the streets/place not meant for human habitation) are required every other year. FL-510 counts people that are in shelter and unsheltered each year.

In the 2010 Point-in-Time count, Whites represented 42.3% of the 4,310 individuals counted in January 25, 2010, while Blacks or African Americans comprised the majority at 55.8% despite only accounting for 25% of the 2010 census data of Duval, Clay and Nassau combined).



The 2016 Point-in-Time count revealed a similar population breakout with Blacks or African Americans being disproportionately represented at 57% of the 1,959 individuals counted on January 27, 2016 (Duval, Clay and Nassau combined).

In the 2017 Point-in-Time count, Whites represented 41.5% of the 1,869 individuals counted on January 25, 2017, while Blacks or African Americans represented 50%.

When comparing the 2016 to 2017 Point-In-Time data, there is a 7% decrease in the number of Blacks or African Americans in the total reported.
